
In addition, we retained the services of a nonprofit fundraising firm to help us gather feedback as well as to determine whether there is enough support from the community for a significant fundraising campaign.

After more than 50 years of service to Saint Therese, and 14 years as Director of Pastoral Care at Saint Therese at Oxbow Lake, Sister Marie Fujan, OSB has announced her retirement and return to St. Paul's Monasterv.

Described as "lighting up a room with her smile and laugh," by Paul Metzler, Executive Director of Saint Therese at Oxbow Lake. Sister Marie will be remembered for her sincere commitment to the Benedictine values.

"Sister's influence on pastoral care at Saint Therese was one of a kingdom mentality," said Daniel Siemens, Pastoral Care Coordinator at Oxbow Lake. "She designed the sign that hangs at our entrance featuring the rule of Saint Benedict that states that all guests are to be welcomed as Christ, and that is the foundation she laid for all who walk through our doors."

"Sister practiced the 'ministry of happy', Siemens went on to say. "Her sense of

humor and kindness could put people at ease during their darkest times."

In addition to serving as Director of Pastoral Care, Sister Marie was also a resident of Saint Therese at Oxbow Lake and made herself available 24/7 to residents and staff during times of grief or need. Sister placed special value on families being present during a resident's passing and would counsel family members on how to say goodbye to their loved ones, encouraging them to share something they will miss or a special memory.

Ruth Anderson, resident of Saint Therese at Oxbow Lake, reflected on the comfort Sister gave her on the loss of her husband and son. "Sister was there for me when my husband was diagnosed with Parkinson's and had to move into long-term care. She was there for me when my son was diagnosed with cancer just days after my husband's death. And she was there for me when my son passed. I will miss her camaraderie very much."

Anderson went on to say, "Sister makes religion a part of our daily lives, it's not just something that's way out there, it's with us all the time and that is a great comfort. As Sister says, 'we are on the porch of heaven."

Saint Therese celebrated Sister Marie's retirement in mid-August.





a legacy of PASTORAL CARE AT SAINT THERESE

In 1968, a group of six Benedictine Sisters iourneved from Winsted. Minnesota and moved into the convent at Saint Therese Home. They cleaned windows, made beds and scrubbed the walls of Saint Therese Home to welcome our very first resident, Mary Zepp. Throughout the early years, the Sisters worked full-time to staff Saint Therese and provide comfort, companionship and spiritual counseling to those who resided there. However, our commitment to pastoral care does not start there, it has an even longer history.

In the spring of 1964, our founders had a vision for a nursing home that focused on whole person wellness with an emphasis on residents' spiritual needs.

"When Father [Gordon] Mycue and I and the other board members talked about what we had in mind, we spoke not only of dispensing the finest medical care," said Jerry Choromanski, one of the original founders of Saint Therese, "but

also a program of spiritual care, and that necessitated a full-time chaplain and Sisters."

With this vision our long history of providing pastoral care to our residents began. Todav. our on-site Pastoral Care staff are available at each of our larger campuses to celebrate triumph and joy or be present through grief and suffering. Pastoral Care staff are called upon to pray following a change in condition, to help with grief, to offer support while making a difficult decision or to simply enjoy a friendly conversation over a cup of coffee.

Barb Rode, current President and CEO, said. "Pastoral Care is at the top of our hierarchy. We lead with pastoral care at the top with Benedictine values ingrained in our culture." No matter what the need is, our Pastoral Care team takes the time to genuinely know, understand and value every individual—forming close, personal meaningful bonds.

"Saint Therese remains staunchly committed to our tradition of helping our residents on an enriching, purposeful faith journey, no matter their religious affiliation. Pastoral care is at the heart of what we do," said Rode.

an enduring commitment PASTORAL CARE TEAM DURING COVID-19

During the COVID-19 pandemic, our Pastoral Care staff have been a great source of comfort for our residents as government-issued protocols impacted the ability to have in-person family visits and our seniors faced increased social isolation.

The Pastoral Care team developed creative solutions to provide much needed comfort and compassion. They used phone calls. Zoom and FaceTime to interact with residents and help them stay connected with family and friends. When residents were grieving or at endof-life, the Pastoral Care staff provided a listening ear and spiritual respite.

As our campuses start to reopen, the Pastoral Care team continues to provide opportunities for residents to express and practice their faith in ways that ensure their comfort and safety.

Weekly Catholic and nondenominational services are broadcast via the campus in-house channels. When feasible, socially

distanced services are held with limited residents in attendance. They also bring Holy Eucharist to apartments and rooms, televise praying the rosary and provide for individual Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

One resident said it best when describing Sister Dianne Perry, Pastoral Care Director for Saint Therese of Woodbury, "Her commitment knows no bounds as exemplified by the way she directs the community in new situations such as the challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic, when she instituted safe environmental practices of the Chapel services. In the midst of suffering and death she brings comfort, consolation and hope to the families of loved ones."

No matter the obstacles faced, our Pastoral Care staff continue to provide the spiritual guidance to our residents and their families. It is their dedication that truly embodies our mission to do ordinary things with extraordinary love.
