IHM Sisters and Saint Therese

An Inspiring and Authentic Transfer of Ownership

In August, the Immaculate Heart of Mary (IHM) Sisters and Saint Therese participated in a moving and formal ritual of transfer of ownership of the IHM Senior Living Community in Monroe, Michigan, to Saint Therese.

Members of Saint Therese and the IHM Sisters congregation attended the event in IHM's beautiful Motherhouse Chapel. There was a formal reading of the Entrustment Document and a ceremonial exchange of the Document from Sister Jane Herb, President of IHM to Craig Abbott, President & CEO of Saint Therese.

One of the more emotional moments in the ceremony was the reading of the Entrustment Covenant, an excerpt from which includes:

"As the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary enter a new chapter of this unfolding story with praise, love and thanksgiving, we entrust to Saint Therese:

An aesthetically beautiful campus that honors the dignity, wholeness and life



journey of each person who lives and works on this campus.

A sanctuary of prayer and spiritual care that embraces the spiritual dimension and inner journey in each chapter of one's life, attentive to the holistic and integrative care

of body, mind, and spirit.

A culture of inclusion that accepts the uniqueness of each individual, welcoming differences in race, cultural background, ethnicity, religion and sexual orientation.

A tradition of learning and growth that encourages and supports intergenerational relationships, the awakening of new understandings, transformation of consciousness and lifelong learning.

A commitment to justice and right relationships that nurtures and promotes human flourishing, and sustains the well-being of all nature as God's good creation."

Craig Abbott, President and CEO, Saint Therese, said "I've worked in the senior services industry for over three decades and this was this first time I've had the opportunity to take part in a ritual of transfer of ownership of this nature. Sitting in the beautiful chapel, surrounded by IHM Sisters and the community-at-large. I was struck by the magnitude and the symbolism of the ceremony, and was sincerely touched by what this means for the IHM Sisters and for all of us at Saint Therese. It's an event I certainly won't forget; I reflect on the ceremony and the words that were shared in the Entrustment Covenant frequently as we now go about extending our mission of doing ordinary things with extraordinary love at the IHM Senior Living Campus."

The Entrustment Document will be framed and displayed on-site at the Monroe campus and also at the Saint Therese office in Saint Louis Park.

Saint Therese

The embodiment of our organization's name and mission goes very deep and the teachings of St.

Therese of Lisieux are at the root of what makes every one of our communities special. Jerry Choromanski, one of our four founders, was strong in his Catholic faith. With his knowledge of St. Therese of Lisieux he suggested her mission become our mission.

St. Therese of Lisieux was a Carmelite nun who never went on missions, never founded a religious

order, and never performed great works or public displays of faith. Instead, she lived uneventfully and grabbed onto every opportunity to love others more that herself. She smiled throughout the day, refused to complain even in hardship, and she performed small, hidden favors for others regularly.

St. Therese of Lisieux called the practice of doing all things (especially little things) with great love, the "little way." She wrote, "You know well enough that Our

Lord does not look so much at the greatness of our actions, nor even at their difficulty, but at the love with which we do them."

She is commonly known as the "little flower" and her image is associated with flowers and roses because she saw the seasons in nature as reflecting the seasons of God's love for us. She saw herself as the "little flower of Jesus," who gave glory to God by just being her little self among all the other flowers in God's garden. We embody the rose in our logo and throughout the stained glass and amenities in our communities.

St. Therese of Lisieux passed away at age 24 and it might seem surprising that she had such an impact. However, with the humble and honest way she lived, the publication of her writings, their circulation, and word of mouth, her teachings did not take long to grow roots around the world. She was made a Catholic Saint only 34 years after her death. This year marks the

100th anniversary of her being named a Saint.


